

Columbia County Master Gardener™ Payback Options 2019



The purpose of the OSU Master Gardener™ program is education. Your focus on those volunteer activities that promote better public understanding of sustainable gardening best go a long way towards keeping our program viable and maintaining our presence as a significant partner in Columbia County's future.

The following list of volunteer opportunities reflects the interests and talents of currently active Master Gardeners. There are three types of activities that qualify as payback hours:

- ***Educational Outreach***
- ***Support Activities***
- ***Continuing Education.***

This list is only a snapshot in time. We have had other projects that have faded and numerous opportunities not yet explored. Please do not hesitate to think about new directions. Contact Chip Bubl or Sonia Reagan if you have new ideas, hear of volunteer opportunities, or have questions. Above all, enjoy your volunteer time!

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Educational Outreach: Educational activities involve direct public contact, but also include your **preparation time** for these events.

Public Information:

- Publicity - Newspapers and other venues are important in getting our educational messages to the public. There are many opportunities to expand this effort.
- Public Speaking - We get many requests for speakers from garden clubs and other groups. If you have a special gardening interest and wish to develop your speaking skills, your talents are needed. The OSU Extension Service office will provide help and guidance.
- Writing - There is always a need for people to write for the Columbia County/OSU Extension Service's newsletter, *Country Living*, to produce educational news releases, and to develop in-depth pieces for local or regional distribution (one of our Master Gardeners has written articles that were distributed statewide by OSU).

- Radio Show - For over 30 years, Darryl Boom and Chip have recorded a 10-minute gardening spot that broadcasts on KOHI every Saturday at 8:05 a.m. There are additional opportunities to do radio spots and public service announcements on gardening topics. Some skill with digital recording and access to suitable equipment required.
- On-Site Diagnostic Clinics – One day at the Oregon State Fair in Salem; five days at the Demonstration Garden at the Columbia County Fair in July; a table at the Spring Fair in St. Helens, and one at the Vernonia Community Garden Plant sale. Other options are explored as they come up. Diagnostic clinics answer public questions regarding plant identification and care, pest identification and management, and other topics covered in class. New Master Gardeners are certified and gain invaluable experience in these clinics. Veteran Master Gardeners need to re-certify by taking a written test before participating (*maximum 6 hours continuing education credit upon completion of test*).
- Demonstration Garden - Located at the Columbia County Fairgrounds, this garden space is meant to educate the public about gardening techniques, design, new plant varieties, etc. Considerable time and effort is required to prepare, plant, and maintain the garden prior to, during, and for several months after the Fair. The public contact is mostly during County Fair in July though we want to promote public activities there at other times of the year. Demo Garden work parties are on Mondays and Wednesdays, April through September from 10 to Noon, and selected Saturdays (dates/times TBD). - Community Gardens – There is an existing community/food bank garden in St. Helens, one in Scappoose, the HOPE garden in Rainier, and a garden in Clatskanie. In addition, several churches throughout the region are starting food bank gardens. These are very important efforts and help to improve both local food production for food banks and to increase gardening knowledge.

- Seed to Supper is a set of vegetable gardening classes taught with hand-on experience where gardens are available and weather permits. Each class is held for two hours, one day a week for six weeks in Scappoose, St. Helens, Vernonia, Rainier, and Clatskanie. Classes and books are provided to students for free by the Oregon Food Bank, OSU Extension, and Master Gardeners. Instructors and Mentors are trained to teach and support students in class. There are also support positions available for people interested in writing short emails and other communications after the classes are complete.

- Scappoose Bay Watershed Council Native Plant Greenhouse: SBWC has an on-going project at Scappoose High School to raise native plants from seeds, cuttings and already started plants to be used for critical riparian area re-vegetation. Support Activities Volunteer hours that enhance or support the Master Gardener™ program but do not directly involve contact with the public are counted as support activities. *(for initial hours of payback, there is a limit of 20 hours in this area of opportunity)*

- Columbia County Master Gardener™ Association - The Association raises money to support the OSU Extension Master Gardener™ educational effort in Columbia County and provides educational programs for members and the public. The Association meets the fourth Thursday of the month with educational gardening programs (see the *Grapevine* newsletter each month for details). The Spring Fair is the major fundraiser for the Association. Continuing Education You can receive payback credit for continuing your education but only if you also participate in other educational outreach projects. *(for initial hours of payback, there is a limit of 9 hours in this area of opportunity)*

- Program portion of Association Chapter meetings (1 hour max each meeting).
- Workshops, tours (*1 hour per*), or clinic orientations.
- Classes (leadership, personal development, repeat of Master Gardener classes or other related content classes). Contact: Chip Bubl.
